

WHAT ARE MY OPTIONS?

Guidance and resources are available to help individuals safely and responsibly dispose of unwanted firearms. Whether it's from an estate or you have let your PAL expire, you have options. In Alberta it is your responsibility to handle unwanted firearms responsibly and safely. Improper disposal can lead to dangerous situations and potential legal issues.

OPTION 1

Contact local law enforcement.

OPTION 2

Sell or trade to a licensed firearms dealer.

OPTION 3

Transfer to a licensed individual.



WHAT TO DO WITH UNWANTED FIREARMS

OPTION 1

Contact local law enforcement.

Do not take your firearms into your local police detachment for disposal. You must contact your local detachment to arrange for pickup or delivery.

WHAT TO DO WITH UNWANTED FIREARMS

OPTION 2

Sell or trade to a licensed firearms dealer.

In Canada, a firearm can be transferred to a business, museum or other organization with a firearms business license.

NON-RESTRICTED FIREARMS

You do not need to register non-restricted firearms to transfer them. However, the transferor (seller) must confirm that the transferee's (buyer's) firearms licence is valid prior to the transfer of a non-restricted firearm.

The transfer of a non-restricted firearm may take place only after a reference number has been issued.

The reference number is valid for:

- 90 days, or
- the remaining period of validity of the transferee's (buyer's) licence

If a reference number expires before the physical transfer of the firearm, a new reference number must be requested.

Online: The licence verification process can be initiated online by the transferor (seller) through rcmp.ca/en/firearms/individual-web-services

WHAT TO DO WITH UNWANTED FIREARMS

OPTION 3

Transfer to a licensed individual.

In Canada, a firearm can only be transferred to adults (18 or older) with a valid PAL that is for that class of firearm designated on their PAL.

RESTRICTED FIREARMS

To transfer a restricted or prohibited firearms, both the transferor (seller) and transferee (buyer) must either:
